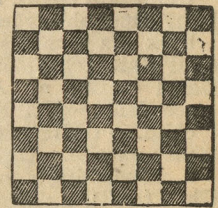


Chap (cháp or chóp), *v. t. & i.* To crack; split. — *n.* Cleft; gap; chink. [plural.]

Chap'peau' (shá'pô'), *n.* A hat.
Chap'el (cháp'él), *n.* A place of worship.
Chap'er-on (sháp'êr-ôn), *n.* A matron who accompanies a young lady in public. — *v. t.* To guide and protect; matronize.
Chap'fall'en (chóp'fal'n), *a.* Having the lower jaw depressed; dejected; dispirited.
Chap'lain (cháp'lín), *n.* Clergyman in the army, navy, public institution, etc. — **Chap'lain-cy** (-sý), **Chap'lain-ship**, *n.*
Chap'let (cháp'lét), *n.* Garland; string of beads. [dler.]
Chap'man (cháp'mán), *n.* A dealer; ped- |
Chaps (chóps), *n. pl.* The mouth or jaws.
Chap'ter (cháp'têr), *n.* Division of a book or treatise; branch of some society.
Char (châr), *v. t.* To reduce to coal.
Char'ac-ter (kâr'ák-têr), *n.* A mark or letter; quality; a person; reputation. — **Char'ac-ter-is'tic**, *a.* Indicating character; peculiar. — *n.* A quality; trait. — **Char'ac-ter-ize**, *v. t.* To describe; entitle.
Cha-rade' (shâ-râd'), *n.* An acted enigma.
Char'coal (châr'kôl'), *n.* Coal of charred wood.
Charge (chârj), *v. t.* To impose; request earnestly; put to the account of; accuse of; load; attack. — *v. i.* To make an onset. — *n.* Care; command; price; onset. — **Charge'a-ble**, *a.* Ascribable; burdensome. — **Char'ger**, *n.* War horse; large dish.
Char'i-ly (châr'i-lý), *adv.* Cautiously.
Char'i-ot (châr'i-ót), *n.* Carriage of state or pleasure. — **Char'i-ot-eer'** (-êr'), *n.* Driver.
Char'i-ta-ble (châr'i-tá-b'l'), *a.* Full of love and kindness. — **Char'i-ty**, *n.* Love; liberality; alms.
Char'la-tan (shâr'lá-tán), *n.* Quack; mountebank. — **Char'la-tan-ism**, **Char'la-tan-ry**, *n.*
Char'lotte Russe' (shâr'lôt rus'). Dish composed of custard or cream inclosed in cake.
Charm (chârm), *n.* Magic power; spell; fascination. — *v. t. & i.* To bewitch; fascinate. — **Charm'ing**, *n.* Delightful.
Char'nel (châr'nêl), *a.* Containing remains of the dead. — **Charnel house**. A tomb.
Chart (chârt), *n.* Map of the sea, its coasts, etc. — *v. t.* To map.
Char'ter (châr'têr), *n.* A deed, or conveyance; patent; grant. — *v. t.* To establish by charter; to hire or let (a ship, etc.).
Char'y (châr'y), *a.* Careful; saving; frugal.
Chase (chās), *v. t.* To hunt; pursue. — *n.* Hunt; game hunted; hunting ground.

Chase (chās), *v. t.* To ornament (a metallic surface) by engraving, embossing, etc.
Chase (chās), *n.* Iron frame for holding pages of imposed type; groove in a wall.
Chasm (káz'm), *a.* A cleft; gap; opening.
Chaste (chāst), *a.* Pure; undefiled. — **Chaste'ness**, **Chas'ti-ty** (chās'ti-tý), *n.*
Chas'ten (chās's'n), *v. t.* To correct by punishment. — **Chas'ten-ing**, *n.* Correction.
Chas'tise' (chās-tiz'), *v. t.* To correct by punishing. — **Chas'tise-ment** (-tiz-ment), *n.*
Chas'ti-ty (chās'ti-tý), *n.* Purity; virtue.
Chat (chăt), *v. i.* To talk familiarly. — *n.* Light talk; a small bird, allied to the warblers. — **Chat'ty**, *a.* Talkative; sociable.
Chateau' (shá'tô'), *n.* Castle; country seat.
Chat'tel (chăt't'l), *n.* Movable property.
Chat'ter (chăt'têr), *v. i.* To jabber; talk idly. — *n.* A prating; noise of birds. — **Chat'ter-box'**, *n.* An idle talker. [Colloq].
Chat'ty (chăt'tý), *a.* Given to chat.
Chauf'feur' (shô'fêr'), *n.* A professional driver of automobiles.
Cheap (chêp), *a.* Of low price; of little value; common. — **Cheap'en**, *v. t.* To chaffer for; beat down the price of.
Cheat (chêt), *n.* A deception; fraud. — *v. t.* To defraud; impose on.
Check (chêk), *n.* Restraint; order for money; mark for verification; design in squares. — *v. t.* To restrain; hinder; rebuke; identify (a trunk, etc.); mark off (a list, etc.).
Check'er (chêk'êr), *v. t.* To variegate with cross-lines; form into little squares; diversify. — *n.* A piece in the game of checkers; pattern in checks. — **Check'er-board'** (-bôrd'), *n.* Board with 64 squares of alternate colors, on which to play checkers. — **Check'ers**, *n.* A game for two persons, each having 12 men (or checkers); draughts.
Check (chêk), *n.* Side of the face; assurance or impudence. [Slang]
Cheer (chêr), *n.* State of gayety or good spirits; entertainment; applause. — *v. t.* To enliven; encourage; salute by cheers. — *v. i.* To grow cheerful. — **Cheer'ful**, *a.* Lively; jolly. — **Cheer'less**, *a.* Gloomy; dreary.
Cheese (chêz), *n.* Curd of milk, coagulated and pressed. — **Chees'y**, *a.*
Chef'-d'œuvre' (shá'dêvr'), *n.* Masterpiece.
Chem'ic (kêm'ík), **Chem'ic-al**, *a.* Pertaining to chemistry. [under-garment.]
Che-mise' (she-mêz'), *n.* A shift; woman's
