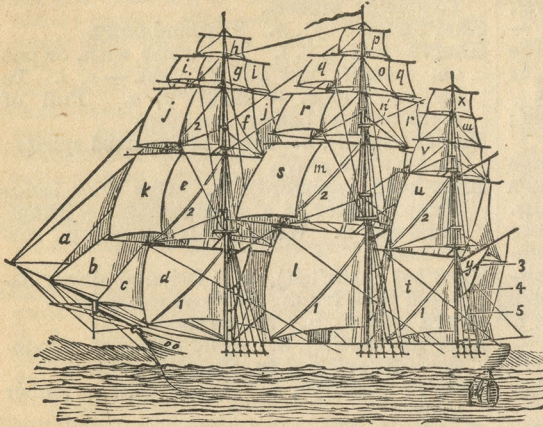
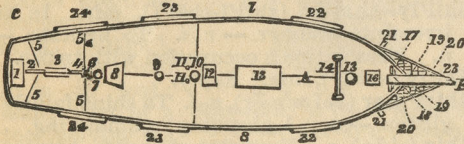


Ship (shĭp), *n.* Large seagoing vessel, especially one square-rigged and having three masts.

— *v. t.* To put on board of a vessel; engage for service on a ship; fix anything in its place; send (freight) by any conveyance.

— **Ship'per**, *n.* One who forwards goods.

— **Ship'mate'**, *n.* Fellow sailor. — **Ship'ment**, *n.* A putting anything on board of a ship or other public conveyance; embarkation; thing shipped. — **Ship'ping**, *a.* Relating to ships. — *n.* The sending goods; ships collectively; tonnage. — **Ship'shape'**

a. & adv. In a seamanlike manner; trim; orderly.—**Ship'wreck'**, *n.* Destruction of a vessel by being driven against rocks, shoals, etc.; ruin.—*v.*

t. To destroy (a ship at sea); expose (sailors) to destruction by the loss of a ship.—**Ship'wright'**, *n.* Builder of vessels. — **Ship'yard'**, *n.* Yard where ships are built, repaired, etc.

Shire (shĭr, shĕr, shĭr, shĕr), *n.* A county.

Shirk (shĕrk), *v. t.* To avoid; slink away.—*n.* One who avoids duty or lives by shifts and tricks.

Shirr (shĕr), *n.* A sewing (cloth) in parallel rows of gathers.—**Shirred** (shĕrd), *a.* Gathered into a shirr; broken into an earthen dish and baked over the fire;—said of eggs.

Shirt (shĕrt), *n.* Undergarment for the upper part of the body.

Shiv'er (shĭv'ĕr), *n.* Small fragment.—*v. t. & i.* To break into many pieces; shatter.

Shiv'er (shĭv'ĕr), *v. i.* To tremble; quiver from cold or fear.—*n.* Tremor.

Shoal (shōl), *n.* Crowd; throng;—said esp. of fish.—*v. i.* To assemble in a multitude.

Shoal (shōl), *a.* Of little depth; shallow.—*n.* Place where the water of a sea, river, pond, etc., is shallow; bar; sand bank.—*v. t. & i.* To make or become shallow.

Shoat (shōt), *n.* Young hog; shote.

Shock (shōk), *n.* Pile of sheaves (of wheat, rye, etc.)—*v. t. & i.* To collect in shocks.

Shock (shōk), *n.* Collision; concussion; surprise; violent agitation.—*v. t.* To strike against suddenly; disgust; offend.—**Shock'ing**, *a.* Striking, as with horror or disgust; offensive.

Shock (shōk), *n.* Dog with long hair or shag; thick mass of short hair.—*a.* Bushy.

Shod (shōd), *imp. & p. p.* of SHOE.

Shod'dy (shōd'dĭ), *n.* Fibrous material from refuse woolen goods, rags, druggets, etc.; poor cloth.—*a.* Made of shoddy; sham; pretentious.

Shoe (shōo), *n.* Covering for the foot; plate of iron on the bottom of the runner of a sleigh, on a brake, etc.; socket.—*v. t.* To furnish with shoes; cover at the bottom.—**Shoe'mak'er**, *n.* Maker of shoes; kind of fish.

Shone (shōn or shōn), *imp. & p. p.* of SHINE.

Shoo (shōo), *interj.* Begone; away;—used in scaring away fowls, etc.

Shook (shōok), *imp.* of SHAKE
